Are the arts a significant part of your everyday life?






Why do you think that students with access to arts learning have higher GPAs and standardized test scores?

"Students engaged in arts learning have higher GPAs and standardized test scores, and lower drop-out rates. The Department of Education reports that access to arts education for students of color is significantly lower than for their white peers, and has declined for three decades. Yet, research shows that low socioeconomic-status students have even greater increases in academic performance, college-going rates, college grades, and holding jobs with a future, 88 percent of Americans believe that arts are part of a wellrounded K-12 education "


"YOU are the ideal grassroots advocate...

Wolf Trap Institute for Early Learning Through the Arts offers professional development (PD) to early childhood teachers built on the philosophy that dance, music, and drama can help young children master skills across a range of subjects. Research has found that this approach, termed arts integration, has great potential for improving student learning in multiple disciplines (Burnaford, 2007; Goff & Ludwig, 2013; Rabkin & Redmond, 2004).
